- Continue through this checklist, making notes, and adapting it to your specific situation.
- Gather your leadership and bring them on board to brainstorm and volunteer for specific tasks.

  - What opportunities can we create to learn about the root causes of poverty?
  - How will we create a healthy partnership with those we will serve?
